Is John DeLorean still in jail for smuggling cocaine?

No, and he never was. During a FBI sting, John discovered drugs were involved and tried to back out. But the FBI informant (not an agent) threatened the life of John's children. To save their lives he reluctantly agreed to meet with them. He was later acquitted on all charges and as a result of this case, the FBI changed certain policies concerning sting operations.



Is this the Back to the Future Car?

Umm yeah, not paying attention? The word "DeLorean" is used in all 3 movies. Most notable in the first. "Let me get this straight Doc . . . you built a time machine . . . out of a DeLorean?" "I figured if you're gonna build a time machine you might as well do it with some style!"



Where's the Flux Capacitor? / Do you go back in time when you hit 88mph?

That's funny, I haven't heard that since tomorrow. Do you see a Flux Capacitor mounted on the back wall with all the other necessary hardware required for time travel according to Dr. Emmet Brown? Personally I'd rather have the Wilson Hover Conversion.



How do you keep it clean?

Dawn dish soap, a sponge & bucket of warm water. Windex & Stainless Steel Cleaner easily gets off your finger prints and other oily dirt smudges. To get out scratches use a Scotch Bright Pad (**not** steel wool) and go with the grain.



How fast is it?

Maximum speed is for a stock DeLorean is about 135 mph. It has tall gears and was meant for cruising the highways and curvy country roads. For stoptight to stoptight drag'n, one of John DeLorean's other creations like the "original" Pontiac GTO is a much better choice!



Do you have problems scratching your doors when you park close to other cars?

No. You actually have more problems with conventional doors because the DeLorean only needs 14 inches of swing space to fully open the door. With normal cars at that distance you'd need a convertible or the Duke boys' General Lee to hop out the window.



How much does a DeLorean cost? *

Initially in 1981 they were to be only \$12K but production & economical problems caused the price to exceed \$26K. Now a parts car is about \$4K - \$8K. Average/Drivable \$12 - \$26K. Refurbished \$30 - \$38K. A prestigious status symbol for \$63K. Or one of the three 24 karat gold plated DeLoreans for around \$225K.



Where did you find this car?

Word of mouth, newspaper ads, Hemmings, E-Bay Motors, etc. There is also an extensive Buy and Sell Listing at www.dmcnews.com. How about the obvious . . . www.delorean.com. If you're look'n, you'll find them.



Isn't it difficult to get parts?

From your local auto parts dealers, yes. In general, no. Almost all parts for a DeLorean from lug nuts to zero mile engines are easily obtainable from various DeLorean vendors.



Weren't DeLoreans made by GM in Canada?

No, ex-GM executive John Z. DeLorean founded the independent DeLorean Motor Company. Roughly 9,000 were produced from 1981-1983.

- The DeLorean assembly plant was in Belfast, North Ireland.
- The body styling was done by the Italian designer Giugiaro of Ital Design.
- The engine is a Peugeot-Renault-Volvo V6
- The undercarriage/suspension and frame were engineered & developed by Lotus.



Why did John DeLorean leave GM and create his own car company?

He wanted to create an "ethical" sports car that was practical, stylish, safe, economical, affordable and long lasting requiring little maintenance. He also wanted to warranty the cars for 25 years! Can't do that in Detroit ;-)



They all look the same, why would you want a DeLorean?

Well, compared to any other identical car today, the DeLorean with less than 9,000 cars made & around 6,000 still on the road it's a little easier not to be like everyone else. Besides that they are: great looking, fun & extremely comfortable to drive, affordable, reliable, the body will never rust and they are relatively easy to work on.



Aren't they always breaking down leaving owners stranded?

Not true. With minor updates and fixes the DeLorean is extremely reliable. 17 years worth of failure rate records and the following listed components all have less than 1% failure rate after 50k miles and less than 5% after 100k miles: Starter, Engine, Ignition Coil, Ignition ECU, Lambda ECU, Windshield wiper system, Shock Absorbers, CV Boots, CV Joints, Brake System, Muffler, Transmissions, HVAC, Fiberglass Underbody, Stainless Steel Panels, etc. Even DeLoreans that have remained outdoors and unused in excess of 10 years seldom have problems when bringing the PRV-6 back to life. Compare this to any other car of the period.
